REQUIRED DRESS CODE 2009-10

We ask that all students wear the required dance attire to class each week. We highly recommend Twinkle Toes in Hampton and Dance Enchanted in Dover. It is important for dance shoes to be fitted properly, shoes purchased at Walmart cost roughly the same and are a trip hazard to students.

Please no jewelry in class. Hair should be pulled off the face. Longer hair should be in a ponytail or bun. Ballet Students with ponytails longer than 3 inches should wear their hair in a bun.



Pre-Dance (Ballet/Tap)

Girls: light pink (classic Ballet pink) leotard with attached skirt, pink tights, pink ballet shoes, black tap shoes. Tap shoes should fasten with elastics, not ties.
Boys: White tee-shirt, black sweats or shorts, black tap shoes, black ballet shoes

Pre-Dance (Creative Movement)

Girls: pink leotard with attached skirt, pink tights, pink ballet shoes
Boys: White tee-shirt, black sweats or shorts, black ballet shoes

Ballet I

Girls: light blue cap sleeve or long sleeve leotard, pink ballet shoes, pink tights (students may wear a dance skirt)
Boys: white tee-shirt, black shorts, black ballet shoes

Ballet II

Girls: maroon camisole leotard, pink ballet shoes, pink tights (students may wear a dance skirt)
Boys: white tee-shirt, black shorts, black ballet shoes

Ballet III

Girls: black camisole leotard, pink ballet shoes, pink tights (students may wear a dance skirt)
Boys: white tee-shirt, black shorts, black ballet shoes

Combo Class: Ballet, Jazz, Tap

Girls: black cap sleeve leotard, pink tights, black tap shoes, black split sole jazz shoes, black tap shoes
Boys: white tee-shirt, black sweats or shorts, black Ballet shoes, black tap shoes, black jazz shoes

Jazz/Tap

Girls: black tap shoes, black split sole jazz shoes, black leotard, tan tights
Boys: white tee-shirt, black sweats or shorts, black tap shoes, black jazz shoes

Hip Hop

Girls: black capri dance pants, any color t-shirt or leotard, split-sole black jazz shoes or dance sneakers
Boys: white tee-shirt, black sweats or shorts, black jazz shoes

Why does MusicalArts enforce a strict dress code?

A dress code ensures that a teacher will be able to see a dancer's alignment and positioning. The teacher needs to be able to see a dancer's mistakes. Baggy clothing can mask bad habits, making corrections impossible.

A dress code will also teach students discipline, helping with overall focus and energy. By "dressing the part," dancers feel like dancers. Dress codes can also create unity among the dancers instead of causing a few dancers to stand out, much like a school uniform policy. Dress codes go a long way in minimizing distractions, and help give classes a unified look.
